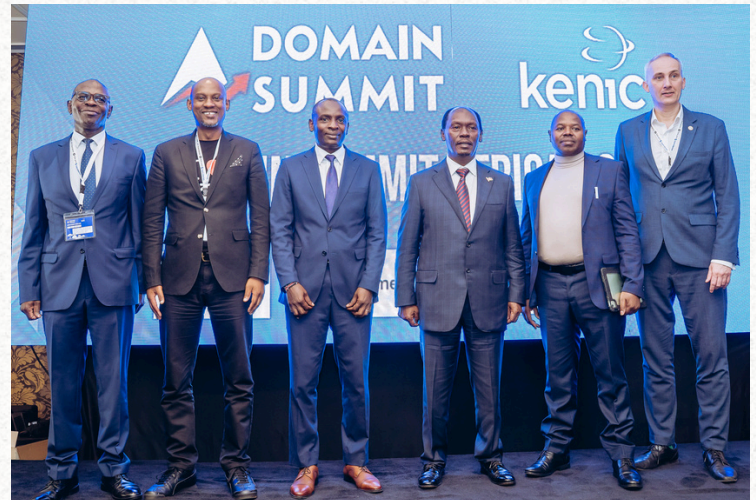


1. KENIC CO-HOSTED DOMAIN SUMMIT AFRICA 2026

The Domain Summit 2026 was successfully co-hosted by the Kenya Network Information Centre (KeNIC) on 23rd and 24th February 2026. The summit convened key stakeholders from the domain name industry, government, technology sector, and private enterprises to discuss developments, innovation, and opportunities within the domain ecosystem.

Objectives of the Summit

- Strengthen collaboration within the domain name ecosystem.
- Enhance awareness of the .ke domain and digital identity opportunities.
- Foster partnerships between registry operators, registrars, businesses, and government.
- Increase KeNIC's brand visibility locally and regionally.

The global internet community determined that it needs more names —creating a timely opportunity for countries, cities, brands, organizations and registered entities (not individuals) to apply for strings of their choice as ICANN opens the next application round this April. This portends significant strategic upside for the domain ecosystem through monetization, brand protection, tourism positioning and digital identity expansion.

Applications will span specialized types, including brand, community, geographic and internationalized domain names across diverse scripts beyond English.

ICANN's role is to facilitate these introductions into the DNS in a structured, secure and orderly manner. In summary, this marks a pivotal, inclusive step forward for the digital economy and the broader domain ecosystem.

Building Africa's Digital Backbone — One ccTLD at a Time

The KeNIC x AFRALTI ccTLD Capacity Development Programme, Cohort 1, concluded and the results speak for themselves.

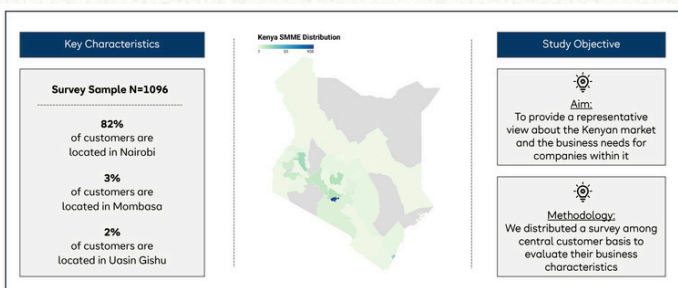

UNIVERSAL ACCEPTANCE DAY ANNOUNCEMENT - KENYA

In partnership with ICANN and USIU – Africa, we are proud to host the 2026 Universal Acceptance Day.

BACKGROUND OF UNIVERSAL ACCEPTANCE DAY

First introduced in 2023, Universal Acceptance (UA) Day is an opportunity to mobilize local, national, regional, and global communities and organizations to champion UA on a global scale.

As in past years, UA Day 2026 events will consist of a mix of in-person, virtual, and hybrid sessions held by the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN), the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), global partners, and regional and local organizations.

The sessions will aim to engage and mobilize top technical and language communities, companies, governments, and Domain Name System (DNS) industry stakeholders to better understand the benefits of UA and how to make their own systems UA-ready.

WHAT IS UNIVERSAL ACCEPTANCE?

UA is a technical best practice that ensures all valid domain names and email addresses, regardless of script, language or character length, can be equally used by all Internet-enabled applications, devices, and systems. While the DNS has changed in recent years, the checks used by many software applications to validate domain names and email addresses remain outdated.

These domain names include new generic top-level domains (e.g., .photography), Internationalized Domain Names (e.g., एमईआईटीवाई.सरकार.भारत/, 红螺寺.网址, صحة.مصر, стопкоронавирус.рф), and country code top-level domains (e.g., .இய). In addition, not all online portals are primed for the opening of a user account with a related email address. That is why awareness of and support for UA is critical for a truly global, multilingual Internet.

BENEFITS OF UA

The current Internet population is made up of more than 6 billion active users, and at least one billion more are expected to come online. Achieving UA for all valid domain names and email addresses is crucial to enabling consumer choice online and achieving digital inclusivity for all of these users. Further, there are important economic and social benefits of supporting multilingual Internet users in their ability to access and connect to ecommerce, local communities and governments, as well as to embrace and proliferate cultural traditions through language.
